


# GREENVALE SCHOOL









We listened to Benjamin Zephaniah's amazing poem and demonstrated our poster in the classroom.

On World Book Day on the 15<sup>th</sup> of March students on the Waters Road Site took part in the grand opening of our new school library. Together Katie and the students cut the ribbon and declared the library opened. The students have been thoroughly enjoying the new space in the school. They are getting very proficient at finding books of interest to them and returning books to their correct spot when they are finished with them. The new space is a lovely area to read, share stories and discover information. It's wonderful to see the students enjoying their new school library.







Students from Waters Road and Mayow Road sites participated in National Careers Week whose theme was **Your FUTURE starts here**. Students in all pathways learned in the assembly that career education helps them to focus on the skills they need to learn presently. Therefore, students engaged in lessons, workshops and activities throughout the week.

Greenvale School had the opportunity to have the Lewisham Foodbank delivering workshops for students in Glade provision as well as Creative Careers from Lewisham Education Arts Network delivering drama, film and animation, ceramics and collage and drawing workshops for students in Key Stages 3, 4 & 5. Students had an exciting week as it enabled them to develop their skills and promote autonomy to prepare for adult life.















This year Greenvale School took part in the annual Big Walk and Wheel competition across both sites. Students were able to complete extra "journeys" for the competition, by using the static cycles, orienteering around school with maps and by using our playgrounds which had activities in them. Students could scoot, cycle and walk to school where possible.

### Waters Rd Student Forum Summary Feb 2024

### Themes students have brought to forum:

The need for more age-appropriate lunch clubs such as boxing, rugby and Cheerleading students would like to see more art projects. Students wanted to go out of school more often trips to seaside and the zoo have been mentioned. More charity fun events as in the past we have had pyjama day and wear a hat day. Students have spoken about having more fun days.

### Actions as a result of forum:

Students looked at the proposed plans for new playground equipment in detail and discussed how the equipment could be used. Students have been involved in discussions regarding school uniform. Students were given a choice of two menus and looked at these in detail, they chose the current menu on offer to the school. Students have had an input in renaming rooms around the school that have been changed to meet there wellbeing needs.

### Impact on the students as a result of action taken:

Students have felt they are informed and involved in decisions. Students have gained confidence in being able to put across their views. There has been some increase in lunchtime activities which students around the school have hugely benefited from participating in. Students recognise that their views matter and will be discussed in weekly meetings and if necessary can be acted upon.

### References to students views on safeguarding that have arisen:

Students have taken part in looking at a map of the school and highlighting areas they felt safe and areas not so safe and the reasoning behind their decision, mainly students did not like busy areas such as corridors and the lunch hall. Every week the agenda contains a section on student safety, in school, in the community and Online safety.

<u>Notes:</u> Students at Waters Rd Forum take turns to do the Forum register, they choose a member to chair the meeting with staff support and a student is nominated each week to write the minutes. All Forum correspondence and displays is done on CIP and a chosen student is responsible for updating the display board with the forum agenda and then following the meeting a student will update the display with the minutes.

### Mayow Road Student Forum Summary February 2024

### Themes students have brought to Forum.

All students said they would like to have the option of different flavoured yogurt, Mousse, and more custard at school lunch.

Students requested they would like to have internal passes when transitioning around the school as they find it frustrating that they must wait for staff swipe to them through the doors. They said this will give them more independence.

Students suggested that they would like more equipment in the playground, e.g. Giant Connect four, soft frisbees soft balls & balls and soft footballs.

2 students suggested that they would like to have access to the group room opposite their class as they have reading and some work time in there.

Some students asked for lessons in sex education. Boys- Girls group

Transport to school students have showed concern that they find the bus noisy at times and music/radio on the bus can be loud.

Students requested that they would like a Wii console, as not all students like to go to the playground at break times. there are lots of active games they can play on them E.g., bowling, golf, baseball etc. we discussed the ideal place for this to be kept, which would be the community room.

Kind room - we discussed the option of a kind room at Greenvale, students seemed very keen on this idea.

### Actions as a result of Forum

Two students typed a letter to School Cook asking for the changes in lunches. Passes have been given to selected students they are very happy with their new independence.

A rota was put into place all classes have a time slot to use the Muga so noise and over crowding will be reduced.

New equipment to be ordered from Kim for lunchtime activities.

Premises team to allow access with student passes to the group room.

I explained to students that they have a choice and can eat lunch where they feel most comfortable.

I spoke to Aaron, he will organise the sex education lessons for the summer term.

We decided to call the common room/ safe space the kind room. Students would really like to see bean bags and strip LED lighting, books, pictures, blankets, cushions magazines, Bluetooth speaker and an iPad to stream music. Magazine's subscriptions to include; Superhero, Hair and beauty, Football, Comics - spider man, Gaming - Minecraft

I have offered ear defenders to students that find the noise overwhelming on the bus some students have phones and listen to their own music.

I will speak to bus staff so they aware of the student's sensitivity to the volume of the radio and to lower it.

Game Wii club to be set up in the community room and a rota to be put into place, Wii to be purchased.

Students were reminded, of movement breaks and finding a quiet place to work... Group room, library, and mentor's room.

### Impact on the students as a result of action taken.

Students are happy that there was going to be options for pudding at lunch time, School cook has taken this on board.

Students enjoy the Muga with the new time slots as it is less busy.

Some students don't like to play basketball or football so they were excited there will be more choice of activities over break times.

Students have more independence when wanting to move to quiet space to read or work independently.

Students said they feel safe around the school and are happy that the time has changed for options groups to 5minutes later so the corridors are not so busy.

The waiting area and the locker area seems less busy which they are more comfortable with.

The kind room is now up and running, the students really like this new room and the independence it gives them creating a space for them to socialise, relax as well as helping them regulate emotions and stress. Students are enjoying building relationships with others in this safe space.

### <u>Safequarding Themes</u>

Students expressed concern that the MUGA gets busy at break times, and they feel unsafe due to being overcrowded - new time slots actioned.

A few students asked if they could eat their packed lunch, school lunch in class as they find the hall too busy/noisy - actioned with class teachers.

One student explained that sometimes he gets a bit anxious when a student in his class gets upset and finds it difficult to deal with - actioned with class teacher.

Feeling safe in school - students indicated on the school map the places they felt unsafe these include the area by the lockers and the corridors when transitioning to option groups - actioned change of group timings to address this.

Students raised that options groups are great but can be noisy - actioned by offering sensory breaks to those students needing it.
